

Short Story Activity with Color Idioms

The Holi festival is a two-day spring festival, originally celebrated in India, which has become so popular that is now celebrated across the world! It is celebrated over the course of two days with a bonfire at night, and a festival of colors the next day. Hundreds of people gather in the street and celebrate by throwing brightly colored powder at one another. For Hindus, each color has a religious meaning. Read the following story about a girl experiencing her first Holi Festival and replace each bolded word/ phrase with a color idiom that you learned.
